Letter from the Interim Pastor

What amazing gifts God has given St. Andrew Presbyterian Church members to share with others and with the world! You have the gift of hospitality and welcome for the new visitor, the gift of wisdom to sensitively follow in Christ's footsteps, the gift of generosity to bring relief to the hungry, the ill-clothed and the un-housed, the gift of proclamation to those seeking Good News, and the gift of commitment through areas delightful and demanding to your sisters and brothers in Christ. And this is only a start to the catalog of your talents.

It has been my pleasure for the past 26 months to serve alongside you as your interim pastor and to experience your unique and exceptional abilities for caring for God's creation and people. I have been called to be the pastor of the First Congregational Church of Cedar Rapids and so my last Sunday among you will be the day of our Annual Meeting, Sunday, February 13.

It says in the letter to the Hebrews, chapter 12:

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross.

I give thanks for the perseverance and the grace that has been so evident in this congregation and among your devoted church staff throughout 2010.

Here is one way - in late October, a line in a special letter I wrote to the congregation said:

Session has determined it is quite likely that St. Andrew staff reductions will be needed at the beginning of 2011 due to financial constraints.

But in November and December, a spirit of response welled up at St. Andrew that was remarkable. The staff greatly reduced expenditures. The congregation answered with strong end-of-the-year giving. And other church groups and teams gave special gifts and stepped back on outlays. It was a successful church-wide effort leading to an end-of-the-year surplus. And so God has turned a dread into a rejoicing as your church staff is now able to share their wealth of ministry gifts with you at full-strength in 2011.

And there is more perseverance that has led to good news: The church mortgage was dramatically reduced in 2010 and is now down to \$42,000. You are very near concluding a years-long mortgage that at one point totaled nearly \$500,000. Would it not be a great gift to you and to a new St. Andrew pastor to move into your next chapter in ministry mortgage-free, loosening up those resources for vital people-to-people projects? And yes in 2011, there will be a need for more perseverance in the race of faith at St. Andrew.

In addition to perseverance, there will also be a continuing need for these Christian qualities: patience with your sisters and brothers, a high level of intentionality and transparency in decision-making, thoughtful leadership and trusting members, and a resolute reliance upon the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, Jesus Christ.

I trust with your many marvelous gifts that you are capable of steadily carrying on, leaning upon the love and hope of Christ through all things.

Friends in Christ, I thank you all for your kindnesses and for your openness to my ministry leadership and efforts. I will keep you and the church staff in my prayers in the coming months. And I will be celebrating with you from a distance as promising new chapters in your Christian ministry unfold here in the Iowa City area.

May you persevere in the race of faith!

Pastor Nominating Committee

The year 2010 began with the PNC's continuing to receive applications for the position of Pastor, Head of Staff at St. Andrew. More than seventy were received prior to closing off the process at the end of May, at which time the more highly ranked candidates were studied further via sermon, phone interview, and miscellaneous supporting documents. By August, three candidates had been selected to visit Iowa City for on-site interviews and to preach a sermon at a neutral site. One candidate declined to follow through two weeks before the scheduled visit. A second candidate visited—and was well liked—but decided not to accept a call if given. A third candidate visited—and was again well liked—but decided largely for family reasons not to accept the call.

In September, the PNC reopened the search. By the middle of December, more than eighty new applications had been received when the committee closed the application period and proceeded to narrow its field. By the end of the year, ten candidates had been selected for further study.

Postscript: In mid-January of 2011, the PNC has settled on approximately five semi-finalist candidates, at least three of whom will be invited to Iowa City in the very near future. In short, we hope very soon, perhaps in the spring, to have a viable person, God's choice for us, to be our new pastor.

Children's Ministries

We had a busy year, and God continued to lead children and their families to St. Andrew.

It takes many volunteers to lead **Sunday School**, and we are grateful for their guidance, flexibility, humor and support. Sunday School offerings supported Operation Christmas Child (The Shoebox Project), UNICEF, Habitat for Humanity, Haitian American Friendship Fund, Iowa City Animal Care Center and Iowa City Crisis Center.

At **Lighthouse**, we covered many topics: Birthday verses, how to stick with God even when you're having a bad day; miracles of Jesus, how to use your Bible and helping others. Lighthouse, for 3rd-6th graders, attracts St. Andrew children as well as children and leaders who attend other churches on Sundays.

Our building was filled with energy and enthusiasm on Monday afternoons, when children in kindergarten through 2nd grade gathered for **Joy Club**. Our time together is filled with games, an after-school snack, a Bible story and related activity, and choir rehearsal. Joy Club kids serve as worship leaders by offering special music during a Sunday worship service about once a month.

Vacation Bible School was our highlight in June, with 119 children and more than 75 youth and adult volunteer leaders. We used Standard Publishing's "Hero Headquarters" curriculum. We ordered the basic package, then adjusted the activities to fit our needs. The scripture theme for the week was 1 Timothy 4:12: Don't let anyone look down on you because you are young but set an example for the believers in speech, in life, in love, in faith and in purity.

FAITHS (Friends Acting In The Holy Spirit) met June 21-25, when 24 students in junior high and high school volunteered for several projects during the week. Some of our projects were rained out but we had a big finish on Friday, when we hosted the annual Grandparents' Lunch.

Children in all of our ministry programs participated in **hands-on faith projects** for the Free Lunch Program, Salvation Army, Hope Lodge, and the Iowa City Community School District Family Resource Center.

Heather Woodin attended the **Children's Pastor's Conference** in San Diego in March, and Kristen DeGrazia and Heather attended the **Children's Ministry Expo** in Lexington, KY, in July. Both events were worthwhile and inspiring, and we are grateful for the opportunity to gather new ideas and to be refreshed.

A direct result of attending the Children's Pastor's Conference was the creation of **F3: Faith/Family/Fun** at St. Andrew. F3 is all about giving families opportunities to grow in their faith, learn and laugh together. F3 events may include worship, family discussion starters, large-group activities, small group/family activities, food, and more.

Our first F3 event was a **Pentecost art project**. Children and their parents worked together to create art pieces inspired by the symbols of Pentecost. Later, we displayed the art and hosted an artists' reception. This Pentecost project was well-received and was based on a traveling art exhibit sponsored by the Presbytery of East Iowa and housed for 2 weeks at St. Andrew.

In October we focused on preschoolers with two special events: **Princess and Prince Nights**. Preschoolers attended with their parents and learned that we are all treasured in God's Kingdom. Both events were a huge success, and likely will lead to more programming for this age group.

Many good things happened in 2010, but it was also a year of challenges, especially with the church budget. As meeting the budget became a deeper concern, there was talk of cutting staff and programs. Paid childcare was eliminated for all programs and special events except on Sunday mornings. The discussions and decisions wore on the staff, and often made it difficult to remain focused on the good things God is doing here. Throughout the year, our goal was to make children and families feel welcomed, loved and nurtured at St. Andrew. That will be our goal in 2011, too.



2010 F.A.I.T.H.S.

If I was to give a “fly-over” of the Youth Ministries of St. Andrew I would have to say that the B.A.S.I.C. (Brothers and Sisters in Christ) and E.T.C. (Eternally Trusting Christ) programs are healthy and growing.

- ◆ Numerically we have seen a steady attendance with both ministries. B.A.S.I.C. students continue to invite friends to attend with them and many weeks we see 1 or 2 new students attending. E.T.C. has not seen quite the growth in numbers but saw many students who had been away from the program make conscious decisions to return.
- ◆ Spiritually, both programs continue to offer opportunities for students to make decisions for Christ and to be offered opportunities to grow in their relationship with God. After jumping “full-in” to the program change that saw the advent of gender/grade specific small groups and the removal of the game time being replaced with a meal. E.T.C. has decided to return this year to the old way of doing things: game, singing, mixed small group Bible studies. This return was driven primarily by the students and a monetary deficit for the meal time. So far this seems to really be working.
- ◆ Camp Stronghold for the 4th summer was nearly at capacity for student attendance with hopes for the same this summer. Ben Halsch was our guest speaker and did a fantastic job of bringing the message of Christ to the students.
- ◆ The Pittsburgh Project saw one of largest teams of students ever attend from St. Andrew (30)! Hopes are for the same this summer.
- ◆ F.A.I.T.H.S. (Friends Acting in the Holy Spirit) again provided a great week of local service projects to junior high and high school students. Nearly 20 students participated at some point during the week.
- ◆ MONDAY/FUNDAY a summer B.A.S.I.C. program created by a summer intern in 2004 saw another successful summer. This program fills a need for alternative fun activities to junior high students each week.
- ◆ In February along with my wife, Peg, I traveled to Haiti to help support Mission Aviation Fellowship and Missionary Flights International following the devastating earthquake.
- ◆ For the second year I have had an integral part in maintaining a monthly gathering of Youth Workers in the Iowa City area. This gathering has been a great resource of support to all those working with students in our area.
- ◆ Enjoy having a great working relationship with Interim Pastor Bob David! And love working with everyone on staff, looking forward to coming in each day.

Things that I had wanted to provide for students that were not met:

- ◆ A trip to Haiti. Due to my brother’s health and his death I was unable to put together a trip to Haiti in 2010. My plan was to put one together for 2011, but due to the health concerns (cholera outbreak) I was encouraged to postpone the trip for another year.
- ◆ More leaders for E.T.C. This is still a work in progress and is one that I have as an immediate priority.
- ◆ Confirmation. I was “semi” involved with the Confirmation Class but I would desire to be more involved in the weekly teaching. As it has been, I have been an office consultant to Kyle Otterbein.
- ◆ A meeting of all staff members who work in some fashion with junior high and high school students to assess how we can better meet the needs of all students without over programming or creating competition for students time and energy.
- ◆ More regular involvement as a “lay worship leader”. I have participated in this but am not on a regular rotation and feel it is important for me to be in front of students and families helping to lead worship.
- ◆ I also would like to provide another mission opportunity for students and their families similar to Hurricane Katrina trips to Mississippi. Not that I am hoping for another disaster but would like to find something that all can participate in together. A family trip to Pittsburgh is currently in the works for spring break 2011.

Things I do outside of Youth Ministries: (Both of which I enjoy doing)

- ◆ I continue to be the staff person in charge of minor repair and service for issues that arise around the church building and grounds. This does not take a huge chunk of time and is something I like to do. I do not meet with the building team monthly but I do consult with them when a professional is called on to repair something *i.e. Bill’s Plumbing to fix a broken drinking fountain.*
- ◆ I also am the one to call our cleaning service (E.J.S.) when there is a concern with our cleaning person (Irvin). I also answer questions that Irvin might have during the week concerning his schedule or a cleaning issue.

Mission of the Music Ministry:

To equip disciples in the worship of God through the offering of musical prayers, the proclamation of God's Word and the singing of psalms, hymns and spiritual songs.

On December 19 the Logos Choir, Cantate Choristers, and Joy Club together sang the words of *Immanuel – God with us*; words of hope to those who live in the shadow of death or stumble in the darkness. If we are honest, each one of us has moments in our lives when we desperately need the light of Jesus Christ to guide us and give us the hope of this reality – that there is no power, there is no depth or height that could ever separate us from the love of God in Christ. So what shall be our answer to the call of Christ? Each week the leaders and participants in the St. Andrew Music Ministry strive to be faithful to this call by giving glory to God in all that we sing, ring, play, and do in response to the incredible gift that has been given to us through Jesus Christ. Valuable time is spent each week not only preparing music for worship, but in building community – walking alongside each other through both the shadows of death and light of life.

The following are some highlights of this past year of ministry together:

- ◆ April 18: Agape Singers + kingsringers present *Let's Go To the Movies!* in conjunction with a dessert reception and silent auction to raise funds for their 2010 concert/mission trip.
- ◆ April 25: Children's musical, *Table for Five...Thousand* by Allen Pote and Tom Long, presented by Joy Club and Cantate Choristers during morning worship and in the afternoon at Oaknoll Retirement Community.
- ◆ May 16: Music Sunday with Cantate Choristers, Agape Singers, kingsringers, Logos Choir and instrumentalists.
- ◆ Matins Ringers played a concert at Lantern Park Retirement Home in Coralville in May
- ◆ June 18-20: Concert mission trip to Chicago by of 20 members (and 9 adults) of the Agape Singers and kingsringers. Concerts were presented at Westminster PC in DeKalb, Bishop Conway Senior Residence in Chicago, and St. Paul UCC in Crystal Lake.
- ◆ A subset of the Jazz Band (now known as the Dixieland Band) practiced over the summer and played in worship in August at St. Andrew and in September at First Presbyterian Church in Lone Tree.
- ◆ Co-hosted a Matthew Smith + Indelible Grace concert on September 10.
- ◆ An increase in youth handbell ringers required two ensembles from one – Jubilate and Laudate.
- ◆ Participation in Alpha & Omega Ringers jumped to 16 ringers!
- ◆ Matins Ringers played Christmas carols for Melrose Meadows residents on December 13.

Soli Deo Gloria! Glory to God Alone!

In 2010, the Deacons maintained regular ministries from previous years as noted below.

- ◆ **Correspondence** - Mailing out Thinking of You, Get Well, Congratulations, etc. cards and notes.
- ◆ **Back to School Drive** - collaborative effort with Consultation of Religious Communities to distribute clothing and school supplies for school children.
- ◆ **Winter Clothing Drive** - collaborative effort with Consultation of Religious Communities to distribute winter clothing to those in need, held in the month of October.
- ◆ **Project Holiday** - coordinate 3 community-based holiday gift opportunities: toys for Salvation Army, food baskets for Crisis Center, and gift cards for Elder Services.
- ◆ **Alternative Gift Market** - participate by assisting committee with preparation, set-up, and hosting a table at the event. This event is focused upon offering gifts for world community needs in the name of a person to whom we would traditionally give a gift or as a personal gift for that need.
- ◆ **Gifts for Parents** - Collaborative effort with St. Mark's and other religious communities for children to pick out and wrap donated gifts for their parents. In 2010, the combined efforts of these churches served approximately 170 children.
- ◆ **St. Andrew Annual Blood Drive** - coordinated with UIHC DeGowin Blood Center.
- ◆ **New Baby Ministry** - Offer and coordinate meals, assess any special needs, send baby congratulations cards to parents and grandparents. In 2010 we were notified about the births of 10 babies to St. Andrew parents. All were contacted, sent cards and offered meals. Meals were provided to 6 of the families. We were also notified that 6 St. Andrew members/families became grandparents in 2010. Cards were sent to these grandparents.
- ◆ **Bereavement Ministry** - Contact of bereaved, assessment of needs, meals, etc. Offer of books on grieving (supplied by Stephen Ministry), referrals to Stephen Ministry as needed. Sending Sympathy cards upon notification of those who have experienced loss. Over 24 individuals and families were served through this ministry in 2010.
- ◆ **Preparation and Serving of Communion** - provide elements, preparation, set-up/clean-up, assist Elders with serving.
- ◆ **Usher and Greet** - second Sunday of each month.
- ◆ **Hospital Visitation** - visitation and assessment of needs.
- ◆ **Post Hospital Visitation** - follow-up of need assessment and coordination of meals, etc., if needed.
- ◆ **Casseroles on Call** - call for and gifting of uncooked meals, stored in special freezer in kitchen.
- ◆ **Flower Delivery** - weekly delivery of Sanctuary flowers.
- ◆ **Welcome Desk** - staff the welcome desk during services each Sunday and relay information as needed.
- ◆ **Neighborhood Support** - recruitment of neighborhood coordinators, serve as back-up to neighborhood coordinators.
- ◆ **Nominating Committee** - one deacon serves as a member of this committee.
- ◆ **Monthly Meetings** - meet as a group the third Tuesday of each month from 7-8 pm to coordinate caring ministry activities, share devotions, offer prayers of support.

In 2010, the Deacons also began a process of reinvigorating our neighborhood identities to which all St. Andrew members and attendees are assigned. This process was led by a team of four deacons (Dedi Walker, Marylu Watkins, Becka Yucuis, and Lesanne Fliehler). Through their discernment and leadership, St. Andrew will publicize the Neighborhood Ministry through a joyful partisan and other methods in January 2011. St. Andrew will again have gatherings of neighborhood groups in the fellowship hall on the fifth Sunday of months (when one exists) beginning January 30, with hopes this will enhance care and personal connections within our congregation.

Deacons completing service this year included Terry Anderson, Patti Benson, Graham Dameron, Lisa Goodfellow-Mertens, and Frank Canady. Deacons continuing in service this year include David Burbidge, Kelly Look, Laura Morton, Bruce Walker, Dedi Walker, Rick Deerberg, Kathy Duys, Cate Koeppen, Andy Smothers, and Becka Yucuis. These deacons had the joy of welcoming new deacons Gary Currie, Lesanne Fliehler, Jill Ross, Marylu Watkins, and Amanda Jacobson.

In a typical week, there are 80-100 requests on the Prayer List. These are categorized, divided among the team members and prayed for every day.

Prayer requests are followed up monthly, so praying is in accord with current needs. Prayer requests can be:

- ◆ Anonymous
- ◆ Submitted on Prayer Cards found in the church pew racks, placed in offering plate on Sundays
- ◆ Submitted on Prayer Cards, placed in Prayer Ministry Box just outside the office workroom door
- ◆ Made by using the St. Andrew web site
- ◆ Made by phoning the church office
- ◆ Shared w/congregation (OR kept confidential, shared with pastor/prayer ministry only)

Most of our prayer is done by individual members in their homes. There is a Prayer Meeting in the church library 2nd and 4th Thursdays of each month at 12:30. Anyone interested in praying for others in our church, our community, friends and families is welcome to join us.

Prayer Ministry also provides:

- ◆ *Quiet Times with God*, monthly listing of daily verses to enhance your devotions.
- ◆ Prayer Corner, monthly article for the *Messenger*.
- ◆ Lenten Prayer Project, where all church members & their families are prayed for by volunteers from our church and prayer ministers.

As a church family, may we "be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer."

And, may we "not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present (our) requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard (our) hearts and (our) minds in Christ Jesus."

Mission, Outreach + Support

The MOS team meets monthly to consider requests for mission support from St. Andrew members, community relief agencies, and Presbyterian and other Christian organizations ministering to youth and students, the homeless, and hungry. In addition, the Team seeks to interpret mission needs and vision to the congregation, such as through helping organize St. Andrew's "Community Garden" project during summer on our new land. Also, MOS hosted in October a special Peacemaking Weekend celebration with Bishop Mano Rumalshah of the Church of Pakistan, who was itinerated throughout the US as part of the PC(USA) General Assembly Mission Council's International Peacemaker Program. Bishop Mano was warmly received and hosted by our congregation, met with ETC together with high school youth from Williamsburg, and spoke at the Iowa City International Relations Council on what it means and costs Pakistani Christians to serve as peacemakers within their communities and among their Muslim neighbors. We are also appreciative of the opportunity during Adult Education hour of sharing the stories of those St. Andrew members who have personally accepted calls to mission, through the "Faces of St. Andrew in Mission" series.

A compilation of where locally-determined St. Andrew mission dollars were allocated is included in the accompanying report of total benevolence giving by St. Andrew in 2010. In addition, MOS recommends to Session the proportion of funds for mission in our annual church budget to be distributed through our denominational connectional channels, and that portion to be allocated directly by Session, on recommendation of MOS. This proportion in 2010 was allocated at 42% for denominational mission (National/International Presbyterian mission funding; Synod; and Presbytery), and 58% for locally-determined mission and outreach.

MOS acknowledges with gratitude the exceptional generosity of the St. Andrew family in giving of its financial resources for mission. Our Team has been in constructive dialogue directly with Session concerning the need to grow St. Andrew's traditional generosity of benevolence giving directly within our church budget, and has suggested means for establishing this as a budgetary priority. Moreover, many St. Andrew members have personally extended Christ's love and compassion within our community, nation, and world. They have responded to special callings such as to flood relief, ministry to the poor and hungry; and to medical mission. Importantly, these calls to mission have been heard by members of all ages, extending from our Sunday School children, through our youth, college students, young parents, and yes, grandparents!

In the fall we worked with the Budget Working Team, Finance Team and Session on the budget. A staff analysis was recommended as part of the overall budget process for 2011. The analysis indicates that St Andrew staff pay is clearly in line with similar positions in other churches of similar size. We are truly blessed to have the staff we have at St Andrew.

We decided not to do annual evaluations this year as we looked closely at St Andrew activities through the staff analysis in the fall. However, we will meet with the staff again in the spring to review goals for 2011.

Presbyterian Men *submitted by Graham Dameron*

The St. Andrew Presbyterian Men no longer meets each month (second Saturday), but rather on a special occasion when some business needs to be discussed, i.e. how we should support various mission projects. These meetings are for all men in St. Andrew who are seeking fellowship with other members in the congregation, to learn more about their community and to nurture their spiritual growth.

The Presbyterian Men's main responsibility is to park cars at St. Andrew during the Hawkeye Football season which allows them to raise funds for charitable projects and programs. Consultant Research Team *submitted by Ellyn Found*

In 2010, St Andrew contracted with Susan Nienaber of the Alban Institute to provide training and small group opportunities that would assist church members and leaders to effectively communicate with one another during times of conflict.

In February of 2010, Susan spent her first weekend at St Andrew. The first day she met with church staff and Session and offered training to anyone interested in conflict resolution and the use of the study circle method. The next two days she offered many small group opportunities, where anyone in the congregation (outside of staff and their families) could come and talk about St Andrew in a study circle format. These groups were very well attended. In fact, many more people attended them than had originally signed up. Following her visit, Susan issued a report to Session. One of her recommendations was the training of congregational volunteers in leadership skills. The purpose of this training was to gain a stronger understanding in how to lead faith-based group dialogues that encourage respect of participants and regard of different viewpoints.

Susan returned for a second weekend to St Andrew in May of 2010 to train any interested congregation members to be facilitators of the study circle method. Susan trained approximately 50 facilitators in this process. At the end of the weekend, the newly trained facilitators had an opportunity to practice these skills in discussing the timeline of St Andrew.

The study circle method was utilized again in August 2010 to discuss the topic of mission at St Andrew. It is hoped that the St Andrew congregation might employ this method in the future when discussing topics related to the church.

Stewardship Team *submitted by John Benson*

Two years ago, a new Stewardship team formed at St. Andrew. Our goal: to treat Stewardship as a ministry. Whereas before we focused Stewardship on the needs of the corporate church, now we focus on the emotional and spiritual needs of the members.

We believe the primary mission of stewardship ministry is to enhance the positive effect of giving on the giver. On growing givers' hearts. If we grow givers' hearts, the funding of the church will take care of itself.

Adult Education *submitted by Rev. Kyle Otterbein*

In January and February, Adult Education was led by our Mission, Outreach, and Support Team (MOS) in a series of presentations that involved our congregation in reflecting on our lives of mission. It was titled *Saint Andrew Members in Mission: At Home and Abroad*. We explored particular missions that our members have participated in, our developing understanding of being a missional church, and the connectional nature of our mission partnerships with other Presbyterians at the Presbytery and General Assembly levels of our church.

One spring session was led by Mike Finkelstein, who invited people to read and learn about *The Jesus I Never Knew*. Class Participants read and discussed the book of the same title written by Philip Yancy.

Our other spring session was led by the Rev. Emory Gillespie, the wife of our interim pastor Bob David. Emory led the class in a fascinating look at the intersection of faith and film in a class titled *The Soul of Cinema*.

Our fall adult education classes kicked off at the end of September with a short but full two week study which involved participants in plumbing the depths of living out our calling to live our faith in the world as we call upon the rich resources of the confessional tradition of the Presbyterian Church and the reformed theological heritage of which Presbyterians are a part. The class, titled *Reformed and Missional: Exploring the Calling to be a Presbyterian*, was led by Jeff Charis-Carlson and the Rev. Colette Soult.

2010 Congregational Meeting Minutes

February 14, 2010

The annual Congregational meeting on February 14, 2010 was held in the sanctuary at 10:25am. The meeting began with prayer. A quorum was present. Pastor Bob explained the congregation responsibilities at an Annual Meeting as per the Book of Order of the Presbyterian Church USA. He welcomed all the confirmands currently in class seeking to become members of St. Andrew. The minutes of the Congregational meetings in 2009 were approved as written. There was a prayer and hymn of Thanksgiving and Remembrance for Merle Heick, Wallace Johnson, Evalyn Filer, Lois Johnson, and Sally Fleckenstein.

The Stewardship Team, represented by Cindy Kasper and John Benson, summarized their work for the general budget for 2010. They will be working on permanent gifts and endowment giving in the next months.

Elder Eric Goers presented how the Finance Team arrived at the 2010 general budget. There were no questions to this presentation.

Personnel Team's Marsha Grady thanked the staff for all that they do. All staff were awarded a 1% salary increase. A question was asked and answered as to how that percentage was formulated. The terms of call of Pastor Kyle came as a motion from the Personnel Team and the Session. The congregation approved Pastor Kyle's terms of call.

Cheryl Johnson and Allen Mebus came as representatives from Session to update the congregation as to the status of the Maxwell Purchase Agreement and the Camp Cardinal Road property. Six months ago Mr. Maxwell asked for a 1 year extension. St. Andrew granted this and Mr. Maxwell has given St. Andrew \$50,000 free and clear and \$50,000 in escrow. The free and clear money went to pay off the line of credit of an old capital campaign debt and to pay the fees for the Alban Institute Consultant Susan Nienaber. Rich Schmidt spoke to renovating the existing facility and made available to the congregation a report he had compiled. The congregational vote for selling the existing property in the Maxwell purchase agreement is on or before November 15, 2012.

Eric Goers explained an upcoming University Heights Sidewalk Project. The project consists of compensation for construction of an 8 foot sidewalk along our property. The construction of this project would take up to 1 year. The driveway would be accessible fully on Sundays and football Saturdays, the city would relocate the utility pole and electric service by the driveway, any disturbed grass would be replaced by sod, trees would be protected or replaced and the city would improve the driveway apron. University Heights has agreed to pay the church \$1 per square foot or \$1,815 to temporarily lease 1,815 square feet for construction purposes. The city of University Heights also wishes to purchase 112 square feet of our property where the street light is located. University Heights has agreed to pay St. Andrew \$22.96 per square foot at \$2,571.52 to purchase this property. The square foot dollar figure was based on the Jeff Maxwell purchase agreement price for the entire St. Andrew Melrose property. The Presbytery has already approved this sale. The corner would remain handicap accessible. Mr. Maxwell's attorney was contacted concerning this and Maxwell has given his approval to this sale and lease. The congregation voted to approve this sale and lease.

Bill Ford explained the current work and ministry of the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC). There are currently 30 candidates they are looking at for the Pastor/Head of Staff position. He encouraged congregation members to be active and if they knew clergy to ask them to apply by looking at the published advertisement of the ministry position. It was noted there is gender diversity and ethnic diversity in the pool of candidates.

Julie Lavelly brought forth from the Nominating Team the names of Dave Dierks and Ruth Dane for the position of elder and Ellyn Found for a position on the Pastor Nominating Committee. The elders would be serving for 2 ½ year term. There were no nominations from the floor. The congregation approved these nominations for the positions stated.

There being no other reports, Pastor Kyle closed the meeting at 11:30 am.
